Today, crafts such as pottery, artistic ironwork, cabinetmaking, stained glass, vegetable-fibre weaving and Mudéjar coffered ceilings still thrive. Many of its makers have earned prestigious distinctions, including Master Artisan, National Craft Award and National Design Award — clear proof that in Úbeda, talent continues to shape a legacy as tangible as its monuments and far more lasting than passing trends.



The Defiant Soul of Clay: Pottery and Jewellery, a Timeless Revolution

Pottery is, without question, Úbeda's most iconic and quietly rebellious craft. Its story is one of resilience: from the first Neolithic communities that challenged time with their clay vessels, through the Andalusí ceramic tradition that survived bans and upheaval, to today's master makers who still stand against the sameness of mass production.

Over the centuries, Úbeda's potters have refined their art like a philosophy, transforming humble earth into pieces that are both objects of beauty and statements of cultural pride. The most distinctive hallmark

of this tradition is the famous verde cobre glaze — an almost alchemical finish born of generations of skill and experimentation. In the kiln, fired clay meets copper oxide in a near-magical process, creating shimmering greens and warm earthy browns that change with the light. At first glance the palette seems understated, yet the longer you look, the more it reveals.

The shapes themselves tell stories: elegant vases once began life as practical water jars, botijos (traditional cooling pitchers) kept homes fresh through Andalusian summers,



and plates carried feasts for rich and poor alike. Work at the potter's wheel is an ancient ritual — the first turn in a craft that still feels timeless. Watching a master potter shape clay by hand is almost hypnotic: clay-covered fingers giving life to matter with a precision no machine can rival.

But Úbeda is not only about clay. It also shines through the art of fine jewellery. In local ateliers, silver and gold are transformed into one-of-a-kind wedding bands, earrings, pendants and bespoke treasures using time-honoured techniques with a modern eye for design. Every detail speaks of patience, craftsmanship and flair. Some

makers go a step further, blending artistic ceramics with precious metals in unique creations that could only come from a city where heritage and innovation go hand in hand.

Úbeda's artisan workshops are far more than shops — they are little sanctuaries of skill,

places where time seems to slow down. Families such as the Tito, Góngora, Almarza and Alamedas dynasties, alongside jewellers like Jareño i Molina, Zenobia and Joyería Ferrándiz, keep this creative spirit alive, passing their secrets from one generation to the next so that Úbeda's maker legacy never fades.



Tamed Fire: The Majesty of Ironwork

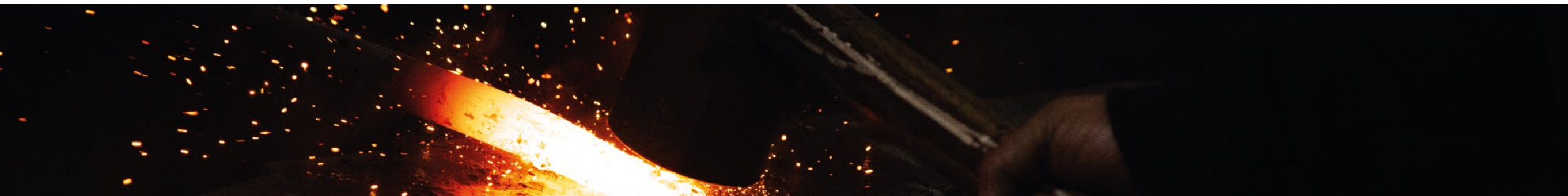
If pottery is Úbeda's rebellious soul, ironwork is its indomitable backbone. This craft reached its golden age during the Renaissance, when master blacksmiths transformed practical metalwork into decorative art that seemed to defy gravity itself.

Úbeda's wrought-iron grilles are the finest expression of that creative boldness: majestic iron masterpieces guarding chapels and balconies, surviving the centuries with effortless pride. Masters such as Francisco de Villalpando and the mysterious Master Bartolomé created astonishingly intricate

works, blending classical inspiration with elegant scrolls, spirals and leaf motifs that seem to grow naturally from the metal.

The forging process still feels like an ancient spell: iron is heated in the forge until glowing red-hot — the moment when metal becomes

as obedient as clay — then shaped beneath the blacksmith's hammer with force, finesse and patience. Even now, the rhythmic sound of hammer on anvil can still be heard in some workshops, reminding visitors that the flame of this craft has never gone out.

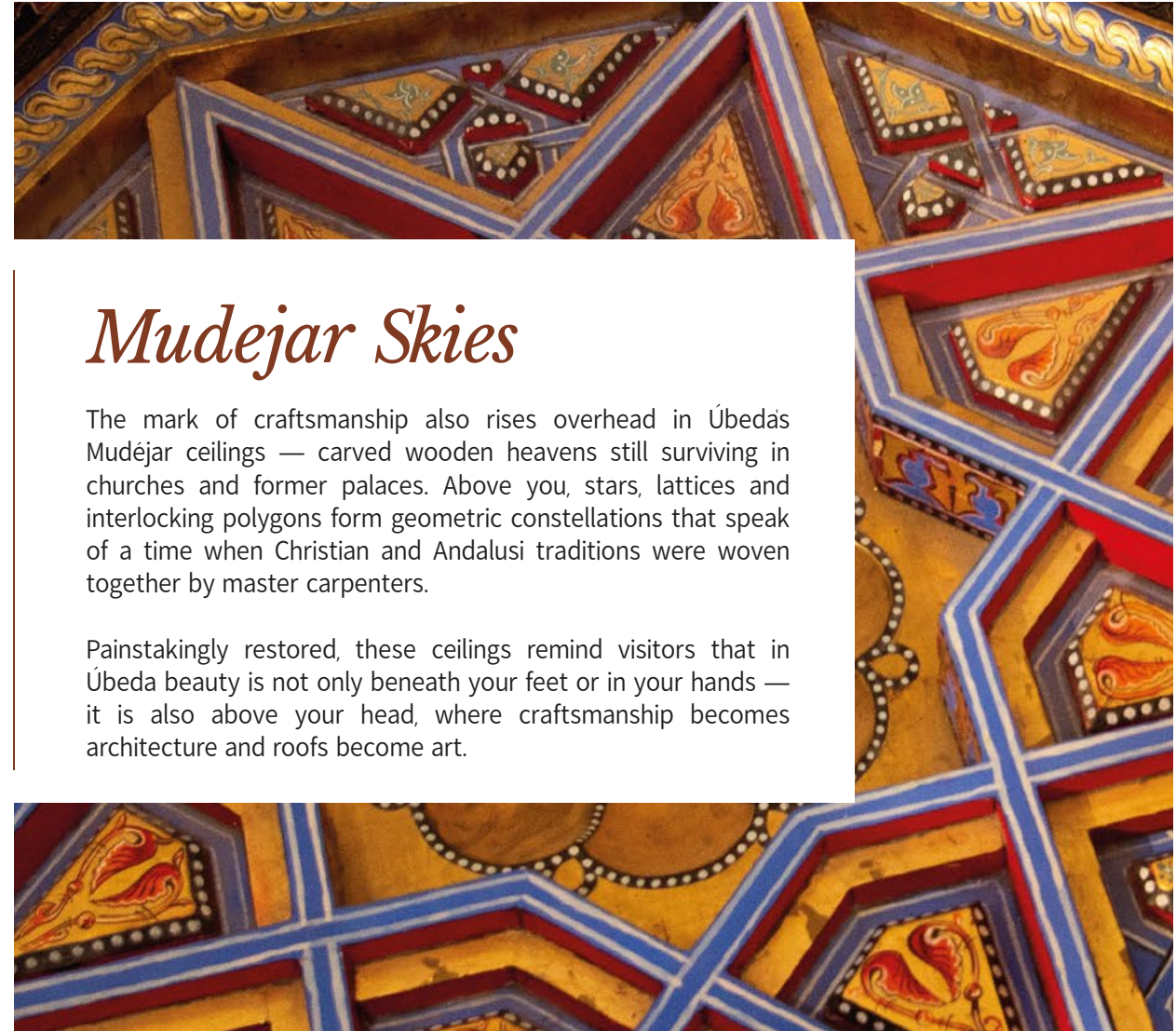




Secrets of Esparto Grass

Yet Úbeda's artisan spirit goes far beyond clay and iron. Esparto grass, a humble fibre gathered from nearby hillsides, has long been the silent companion of daily life: ropes, baskets, mats and panniers that once made country living possible.

In workshops scented with freshly soaked fibre, hands still braid, stitch and twist esparto with inherited skill. Every stitch forms clean, timeless geometry, turning a simple material into pieces that now sit beautifully in contemporary interiors while keeping their rustic soul intact.

The mark of craftsmanship also rises overhead in Úbeda's Mudéjar ceilings — carved wooden heavens still surviving in churches and former palaces. Above you, stars, lattices and interlocking polygons form geometric constellations that speak of a time when Christian and Andalusian traditions were woven together by master carpenters.

Painstakingly restored, these ceilings remind visitors that in Úbeda beauty is not only beneath your feet or in your hands — it is also above your head, where craftsmanship becomes architecture and roofs become art.
